HERITAGE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes February 28, 2021

- 1. Rev. Alick Kennedy opened the meeting with prayer at 11:01 AM.
- 2. Clerk of Session Peter Wildfong certified there was a quorum present.
- 3. Rev. Alick Kennedy read the *In Memorium* in honor of Barbara Ann White, who passed into Christ's Loving Arms on January 2, 2020.
- 4. Clerk of Session Peter Wildfong reviewed that the minutes of Meetings of the Congregation held on February 23, 2020, June 24, 2020 and October 5, 2020 were included in the 2020 Annual Report. As permitted by the Presbytery and authorized by the Congregation in 2012, the Session approved these minutes at previous meetings.
 - *Motion: To approve the report of the Clerk of Session (Donna Johnston; 2nd Marilyn Bond) the motion was voted on and approved unanimously.
- 5. Clerk of Session Peter Wildfong announced the motion from the Nominating Team for Election of Donna Johnston as Church Financial Secretary.
 - *Motion: To elect Donna Johnston for an additional one-year term as Church Financial Secretary. The motion was made by the Nominating Team (no 2nd required). The congregation voted unanimously to approve the motion.
- 6. Clerk of Session Peter Wildfong reviewed the written Session Report (in lieu of a Pastor's Report) (2020 Annual Report). He highlighted the ongoing work of the congregation to remain connected, despite the struggles caused by the 2020 global pandemic.
 - *Motion: To receive the report of Session in lieu of a Pastor's Report (Denton Bond; 2nd Bill Johnston). The congregation voted unanimously to approve the motion.
- 7. Clerk of Session Peter Wildfong reviewed the Youth Leader's Report (2020 Annual Report).
- 8. Dan Vitale reviewed the report of the Nominating Team. The Nominating Team made 2 nominations for the 2021 Nominating Team: Dan Vitale and Joanne Dunmyre. It was announced that a Session representative to the Nominating Team (Elder Denton Bond) was approved and voted on by Session.
 - *Motion: to elect Dan Vitale, Joanne Dunmyre, and Denton Bond to the Nominating Team for 2021 (Bill Johnston; 2nd Jaime Griffin). The motion was voted on and passed unanimously by the congregation.
- 9. The congregation heard the reports from representatives of each team:

- a. Christian Education (CE). The written report (2020 Annual Report) was reviewed by Elder Wendy Cibula. The 2020 Team Leader was Julie Halyama. Ted Griffin was instrumental in getting Sunday School online during the pandemic, which has worked extraordinarily well and continues in 2021. Dan Vitale led in-person adult Sunday School through the Fall and continues in 2021. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, the CE Team continued to keep in touch with C.A.R.E. moms and help them throughout the pandemic.
- b. Mission and Evangelism (M&E). The written report (Annual Report 2020) was reviewed by Elder Jaime Griffin. The church held its first ever virtual 5k fundraiser in summer 2020. The team also took over the Bellevue Meal Ministry (held in early 2020; and looks forward to continuing once it is safe to do so). We continue to support the missions that we have done in the past and in 2021 we look for new and creative ways to continue the mission work of the church.
- c. Membership, Fellowship & Care (MFC). The written report (2020 Annual Report) was reviewed by Linda Felkar. The MFC Team paid tribute to Elder Carol Jo Seapker who passed into Christ's loving arms on February 4, 2021. The Word of the Month initiative, which began in 2020 will be continued through 2021. Throughout the pandemic, the MFC Team made care calls to maintain contact with and pray for the members of the congregation.
- d. Stewardship, Administration & Finance (SAF). The written report (Annual Report 2020) was reviewed by John Cibula. The SAF Team thanked members of the congregation who participated in the April 4, 2020 Work Day. Although Heritage Wellness Ministry was closed for much of 2020, it has had a few weeks of socially distanced re-opening, which continues in 2021. The deficit of \$7,512 for 2020 (was offset substantially by PPP money of \$25,887). The balance on the mortgage is \$54,318.
- e. Worship Team (WT). The written report (Annual Report 2020) was reviewed by Elder Peter Wildfong. Worship continued, thanks to the creativity of the congregation during 2020. A big thanks to the entire Cibula family, Ted Griffin, and Donna Johnston for helping with countless details of worship at Heritage at a time when so many members are unable to attend in person. Elder Wendy Cibula also thanked Rick Berg and Carolyn Briggs for work on pulpit supply, ensuring that we have pastoral coverage through 2021 while we search for a new pastor.
- 10. The 2019 Auditor's Report was completed by Randy Thomson and Sonny Jani and is on file in the church office. The 2020 audit will be completed by Sonny Jani and Dan Vitale.
- 11. Treasurer Bill Johnston reviewed the 2020 Financial Report. He reiterated that 2020 closed with a \$7,512 deficit, which was offset substantially by the PPP money received from the Federal Government. He requested continued prayers by the congregation to allow continuation of the ministries of the church in the community, country, and world. He also asked for continued generosity and faithfulness as we move forward as a church.

12. John Cibula reviewed the 2021 Investment Plan. Pledges are smaller for 2021 (\$108,570) reflective of the departure of 4 families at the end of 2020. Without a current pastor, the biggest reduction in projected budget was the Pastoral Leadership line. All told, the 2021 Investment Plan projects a deficit of \$41,065 for the coming year.

13. Adjournment

*Motion: To accept all reports and adjourn the Annual Meeting of the congregation of Heritage Presbyterian Church (Dan Vitale; 2nd Marilyn Bond). Rev. Alick Kennedy closed the meeting with prayer at 11:37 AM. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously by the congregation.

Heritage Presbyterian Church Virtual Congregational Meeting January 10, 2021

The meeting was called to order with prayer by Rev. Brian Wallace at 11:00 AM. The Clerk certified that there was a quorum present.

Brian Wallace introduced the purpose of the meeting was to formally dissolve the pastoral call between Rev. Dr. Brian Janssen and Heritage Presbyterian Church. Rev. Wallace provided a brief overview of Pittsburgh Presbytery's role in the pastoral transition process. Rev. Wallace opened the floor to questions from the congregation about the transition process. In response, to a question regarding timeframe, Rev. Wallace clarified that the search for an Interim Pastor or next Pastor is hoped to begin in the next month, but could take anywhere from 6 months to one year according to regular timelines.

*Motion: To formally dissolve this pastoral relationship between Rev. Dr. Brian Janssen and Heritage Presbyterian Church (Dan Vitale; 2nd Wendy Cibula). The motion was voted on and approved unanimously by the congregation.

*Motion: The congregational meeting should be adjourned (Denton Bond; 2nd Dan Vitale). Rev. Brian Wallace concluded the meeting with prayer at 11:06 AM. The motion to adjourn was then approved unanimously by the congregation.

Heritage Presbyterian Church Congregational Meeting September 12, 2021

The meeting was called to order with prayer by Pastor Emily Cooper at 11:06 AM. The Clerk certified that there was a quorum present.

Pastor Emily Cooper presented the report of the Nominating Team. The Nominating Team called for a motion to elect Linda Felkar (1st 3-year term, Class of 2024) and Sue Ritchey (1st 3-year term, Class of 2024), to Session for 3-year terms. The motion was seconded by Bill Johnston. There were no nominations from the floor; the motion was approved unanimously by the congregation.

A motion was made by Rick Berg to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded (Donna Johnston).

Pastor Emily Cooper concluded the meeting with prayer at 11:11 AM. The motion to adjourn was then approved unanimously by the congregation.

Pastor's Report

Heritage Family,

I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know each of you. This is a wonderful congregation with so much going on! While our overall membership numbers may be decreasing our reach into the world continues to grow and bless others. I have been blessed by working alongside those of you who serve our community whether the Wellness Ministry, CARE, Bellevue Meal Ministry, or another area. I am pleased to say that the church continues to manage the pandemic well. Heritage has been blessed by folks who worked diligently to provide worship experiences throughout this tumultuous time. I often remark that it is so clear that the Spirit is alive and well in our community.

With all the above statements being true, I must also point out that the church has significant financial challenges. The church has been operating with a deficit, which continues to grow. I hope that you will all take some time to review the financial position of the church. It is very important to me that all members of the congregation understand Heritage's financial picture. Session is working towards discerning the future God is leading us towards. There are several options, and I am confident that we will be able to faithfully follow God's path.

You will note that we ended 2021 with a deficit of \$23,368. We were the recipients of a PPP loan which helped to offset the deficit by \$20,057 which lowered the impact on the church's bottom line to \$2,311 assuming that loan will be forgiven. This year we are projecting a deficit over \$90,000. The substantial increase is due to the cost of a full-time pastor. The pastoral expense for 2021 was less than half the cost for a full-time pastor due to my start date. The budget for 2022 demands that we explore new options for how we operate. I am committed to helping you all, especially Session, look into the various options as we prayerfully discern the future for Heritage.

I do not share the above information to cause worry or fear. I believe that it is vital we all understand where we are so that we are able to listen carefully for where the Spirit is leading. It is often when we least expect it that God provides the exact blessing we need. I am writing to you all from a place of hope for the work that lies ahead. God will continue to walk among us and bring us into the place He has already prepared.

Christian Education Team Annual Report 2021

It is my pleasure to present this report to the congregation of Heritage Presbyterian Church. In 2021 I completed my first full year as the Youth Director of Heritage Presbyterian Church. In the fall of 2021 I also took over leading the CE team. I am happy to say that during 2021, despite finding ourselves with some challenges in our path, such as a global pandemic and with our Senior Pastor leaving, Christian Education has thrived here at Heritage.

Sunday School

During the spring of 2021 Denton Bond and Erika Jani team taught a study of Ruth to the children of Heritage. This September classes began with our first Rally Day Celebration as well as our annual Blessing of the Backpacks. We plan to make this a tradition for our first and last classes of the year. Ted Griffin, Pam Dierker and Bobbie Berg spent this fall team teaching a study of the Lord's Prayer. Thank you to all of the teachers who have volunteered their time to work with our youth.

Nursery

We were excited to again open our nursery in the fall of 2021. Like the schools in our area, in our Sunday school classes and nursery, we follow all CDC recommended guidelines. Volunteers are masked, we make sure to clean and sanitize, maintain social distance and small class sizes when possible, and weather-permitting to hold classes outdoors. Thank you to Erika Jani who helps to organize our nursery volunteers.

Confirmation

With the arrival of Pastor Emily to our congregation in July, she began a confirmation class for several of our teens. We are so thankful to see all that they are learning and are looking forward to their confirmation in May of 2022.

Care Program

In October we were also pleased to begin our Care Program again in the fall of 2021. Anchorpoint was able to provide two child care workers to handle childcare during the Care Program. We have been excited to see how this program continues to evolve and change. We are thankful to all of the volunteers who volunteer their time, their energies and their food to this outreach opportunity.

Heritage Family Events

Starting in September of 2021 we began to hold family events. The idea behind these events were for fun family events to be offered to our congregation as fellowship opportunities but also as outreach to the community. In September we held a family game night with a variety of games and snacks. In October we held a very well attended Trunk or Treat event. This December we finished the year with our annual Pancake Breakfast Fundraiser to benefit our youth group and also held our annual Christmas Pageant. We hope to continue these events in 2022.

Youth Group

We had so many fun outreach events this year. In January we were not able to attend our annual Winter Jam concert at PPG place due to it being canceled because of Covid. So we did what we do best and threw together a virtual music festival with music, messages and food.

In February we were able to explore our passions as followers of Christ. We had an amazing event, which included yoga, making spa supplies, video games and more. Thank you to all of the youth leaders who shared their talents with our youth.

In March we held our first ever Mini Golf Mania. We set up a miniature golf course all over our building. This was followed by our first ever Mess Fest and boy did we get messy. Giving and Support:

Despite the trials of the pandemic, we were still able to support our mission partners:

Pittsburgh Presbytery

Local Missions supported – The Pittsburgh Project, The DoorWay, The Pittsburgh Experiment, Women's Choice Network, and Anchorpoint

Global Missions – United Shram Ashram, Wycliffe Bible Translators, and World Vision.

Hands-On Mission Efforts included:

Heritage's second annual virtual 5K – participants signed up online and had a week window of time to complete a 5k run or walk. Proceeds from this event totaled over \$2,500 and went directly to North Side Food Pantry in memory of Carol Jo Seapker

North Hills Food Bank - collection of nonperishable grocery items each month. Christmas Angel Gift Tags for The DoorWay returned in person instead of virtually.

Bellevue Community Meal Ministry – was restarted in October on the 4th Monday of the month using a hybrid model of take away packed meals. We were overwhelmed with help from the congregation the Sunday prior and were able to deliver 50 bagged meals in October and 50 Thanksgiving style meals in November. In December we delivered 18 dozen cookies to support their cookie exchange.

New in 2021:

Mission team started a virtual book study on zoom to engage not only local people and people of our congregation but also people living in states all over the country. We successfully completed two book studies in 2021.

Wellness ministry moved from Stewardship and Finance to Mission Team. Our plans for the ladies of the wellness ministry in 2022 is to start inviting them to take part in the community outreach hosted through Mission Team. They already take part in some of Heritage's events such as Trunk or Treat.

2021 Highlights.

- Workday April 4, 2021. Thanks to the volunteers that cleaned, washed windows, pulled weeds, trimmed shrubs and scrubbed the outside playground equipment.
- Multiple leaks in the roof over fellowship hall were temporarily repaired. Estimates have been provided by two roofing companies for more permanent repairs. The North wing roof was sealcoated. Front door and front windows were painted by Denton Bond and Ray Horz. The fellowship hall was buffed and waxed, and holes were filled on both sides of the building outside where mice may get in. We still have a lot of work to do but we try to stay on top of the list.
- The driveway and parking lot require future maintenance.

Tech Team: Tech was improving our worship streaming game with some new equipment. A new Mac Mini was purchased along with 2 monitors, a high speed hub and a Blackmagic camera switcher. These allow us to have the ability to use multiple cameras to zoom and pan during the service, improving enjoyment for those who view our services online. Both cameras at this time are being borrowed. Ted Griffin has played a huge role in getting us streaming online and figuring out all the technology and equipment needed. We are still learning and I expect steady improvements while being mindful of our budget and steadily improving skills of volunteers to operate the equipment.

Stewardship:

- 1. Twenty six (26) units have pledged \$112,060 for 2022.
- 2. Total operating fund ministry receipts for 2021 were \$165,774.
- Total operating expenses for 2021 were \$168,085.
- 4. 2021 ended with a deficit of \$2,311. This includes Payroll Protection Program (PPP) Money received of \$20,057.

Finance:

- 1. Budgeted mortgage payments of \$25,200 were paid to the bank in 2021. Balance on mortgage is \$30,000.
- 2. Dan Vitale and Sonny Jani have completed an audit of Heritage's 2020 financials.
- A big thank you to Bill and Donna Johnston who handle the accounting and keep our books in great shape, which is no easy task.
